# Vision & Ethos

## The WCSCF Vision:

We have a vision of strong, healthy families where children can reach their full potential, where communities are safe for children and no child is living, working or begging on the street.



## The WCSCF Ethos:

We believe that children belong in families, that safe communities need to be created, that no child should be living, working or begging on the street and that everything should be done to prevent this.

When this does occur (OR children do end up on the street), we believe that, although they have specific needs, they are children with the same potential as any other child, they have equal human rights, and they should be cared for and protected by law. Therefore, we support:

- Strategies that connect with the unique needs and dynamics of every child within an holistic approach,
- Therapeutic interventions to support children to develop an alternative lifestyle off the street, and
- Interventions that ensure their access to care that address their specific needs.



## Chairperson's Report

We are excited to be able to report on this NEW SEASON for the WCSCF as we continue the work of developing partnerships in the vulnerable children sector to empower, advocate and integrate our efforts collaboratively.

The Provincial Department of Social Development (DSD) recently implemented a more targeted strategy of **Prevention and Early Intervention services** within the communities, by funding a Social Work post for each Drop-in Centres (DIC's). Due to our close networking relationship with DIC's and our consistent capacity building within this sector, we are well-positioned to render Supervision services to these new Social Workers. The WCSCF are honoured to be part of this process and we commend DSD for ensuring a proper and professional psycho-social service at each registered and funded DIC.

COVID-19 pandemic hit, changing our way of working and impacting everyone, especially vulnerable children. Our registered and unregistered DIC's, soup kitchens and other local social relief initiatives, soon became the only way to ensure the survival of many of our vulnerable children and their families, who needed access to food security—a desperate Sector found innovative and wonderful ways to network and share resources.

Our mandate to advocate for homeless children found Janice part of the team of Human Rights Commission Monitors visiting the Strandfontein Homeless Site erected by the City of Cape Town. Although assured there were no children on site, 15 children were thereafter referred to an appropriate shelter. Although face to face will always be our first prize, Covid has brought about a new and wider range of connecting opportunities and we foresee opportunities to reach more NGO's virtually than ever before.

A big shout out as always, to our devoted staff members for their passion, compassion and consistency, despite a total change of circumstances, as well as our Exec for their time, assistance and enthusiasm to serve the forum and our children!

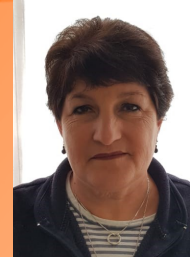

# Treasurer's Report

It is my pleasure to report to the Members on the state of the WCSCF Finances. Our budget was unexpectedly stretched a few months into this financial year with increased funding and increased responsibility from DSD in the form of an extra Social Workers Supervisors post. This meant our 3 annual trips to the Eden Karoo increased to monthly trips, greatly increasing costs. Our planned budget needed to grow resulting in a small deficit for the organisation. Our investment reserves allowed us some cushioning to maintain cash flow. The Annual Financial Statements of the WCSCF for the fiscal year 01 April 2019

to 31 March 2020 have been prepared by our Accounting firm, Bounce Up Consultants, and include the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2020, the statements of operations, status in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended. These are currently being reviewed and audited by our auditing firm, Audprop and will be posted on the website and emailed to Members when completed. We would like to thank Bounce Up for their excellent service to the Forum.

One of the characteristics of a proper and effective network is to adapt to new circumstances and challenges to make sure the sector still receives services (in this case essential services) to survive. So, during this COVID-19 pandemic, we applied for funding via Connect Network who were responsible to distribute funds that Sanlam made available for crisis feeding programs resulting from the Lockdown imposed by National Government. The WCSCF then distributed these funds to assist some of the registered and unregistered Drop In Centre partners in their provision of these extra services. The WCSCF received a small portion of this for administration. We want to thank each and every member of our forum who walked the extra mile during this trying time to assist our children and their communities.

In order to save on overall costs, and due to the increased travelling, we have decided to buy a WCSCF vehicle.

With financial pressure on the Sector due to Covid-19 Lockdown, the WCSCF decided to waive it's Membership Fee for the current financial year to give our committed Member organisations a break. Despite the difficult time we find ourselves in, the WCSCForum remains in good financial standing.

## Drop In Centres Supervision



After years of lobbying for more Social Workers for vulnerable children, the WCSCF was delighted when Provincial DSD Children and Families Programme decided to fund Social Workers for WC Drop In Centres serving over 30 children. We were also very interested when DSD asked the WCSCF to supervise these DIC Social Workers, as we had invested years in the development of this small sector in the WC and knew we would have a lot to offer them in terms of understanding the DIC role, connections and training content.

Drop In Centres play a pivotal function in providing Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) services to vulnerable, abused or neglected children in communities—they are part of a basket of PEI services that aim to keep children who are at high risk from going deeper into the Statutory system (removal into children's home) or dropping out of school, by offering them basic services (food, hygiene, laundry), emotional, physical and social development support and educational support. The Centres work with the family to preserve and strengthen it as the foundational core of the community, providing parental support and training. DIC's run therapeutic and skills development groups for adolescents, holiday programmes, afterschool homework programmes and offer individual therapy and counselling for individuals. amongst other services. (see Childrens Act, Chp 14)

As a part of a bigger system, a DIC must take a collaborative approach, working in an integrated, relational way with other sectors in order to assist children and families. This would include referrals to Designated Child Protection Organisations, SASSA for appropriate grants, the WCED for academic placements and assessments, SAPS for women and child protection, and the Dept of Health. The WCSCF is well positioned to assist and encourage them in this.

We have enjoyed developing this even closer partnership with WC DIC's to ensure their increased effectiveness and growth and help them meet their goals. It is a pleasure to work with these committed, caring and brave organisations and to be of assistance to them and their Social Workers in the form of Supervision and Training support. We are excited that it is in the heart of Provincial DSD to register more DICs in the WC and provide them with Social Workers.



## Mentoring & Support of DICs

Since 2013, the WCSCF has worked with Drop In Centres (DICs) to assist them towards their compliance of DIC Norms and Standards stated in the regulations of the Children's Act. We provided them with training and guidance towards their creation of safe spaces for vulnerable children in the areas of child protection, children well-being and development, governance and policy, etc according to their expressed needs and our understanding of their role.

In 2019, we partnered with the Connect Network, specifically in their offering of the Quality Improvement System (QIS) Process, an accredited organisational capacity building programme aimed at small to medium sized non-profit organisations working with children. The goal of the programme is to improve the quality of care and service provided to women and children at risk by focusing on developing quality standards in the areas of :

As well as offering this support to the registered, DSD-funded DIC's, we also focus very seriously on those unregistered organisations offering vital child protection and caring services to vulnerable children in communities, unrecognised or seen by government. We see the work they are doing and recognise their need to be assisted, on every level, as well as the need for them to be monitored. Our goal is to also bring them up to a high standard of service delivery and for them to become REGISTERED and 'legitimate' DICs.

# Lobbying & Advocacy

April -

Assisted and advocated for social services to be given to children at the **Reclaim the City Occupation** site at the old Woodstock Hospital, filled with families evicted from the area. Also assisted with Trauma De-briefing after a violent Police/Army raid at 2am in August with adults & children.

July - **Child Murders Commission** @ Provincial Parliament representing WCSCF.

Sept - participated in **National Plan of Action for Children 2019-2024** Consultative Workshop.

Nov - Meeting with **More than Peace** to discuss the children being affected during the current Refugee Protest Crisis in CT. This was then raised with Dr Corrie, DSD Children & Families Programme.

May - Contributed as one of the speakers at the **WC Commissioner for Children Roleplayers Roundtable** arranged by Molo Songololo.

On the 4th of September 2019, Uyinene Mrwetyana's brutal murder at the Claremont Post Office lead to mass picketing and an **Anti-Gender-Based Violence** March to Parliament. The WCSCF Team participated in this March.

June - Appealed to the **SA Human Rights Commissioner** to assist a foreign family with six children who, after assisting a trafficked woman, were being victimised by a Congolese Gang.

June - Participated in the **Annual Service of Blessing and Hope for Children** at Gardens Presby during Child Protection Week.

On the 5th Sept, the Team represented the WCSCF in a heartfelt discussion with the **National Cabinet** on issues of gender-based violence. Later that month, we were invited to attend a **National Parliament sitting** to hear formal submissions on the issues of violence against Refugees and Gender Based Violence.



The WCSCF **All Regions Quarterly Meetings** are used to provide information

and connections which we know the vulnerable children's Sector needs. This year, our Guest speakers were:

- In May: **Elmarie Malek, Dept of Health**, sharing on the 1st 1000 days of a child's life from conception onwards.
- In November: **Monica Woodhouse, Give a Child a Family**, sharing on their successful approach to FosterCare in KZN.
- In February: **Dr Rochshana Kemp, WCED**, on the **SIAS protocol** which exists to assist Learners with Learning Barriers.
- And at our AGM in August, the inspirational, encouraging presence and words of **Lorenzo Davids, Community Chest**.

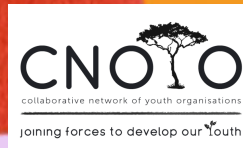

# Give Responsibly

## THINK before you give

*We know you care. We know you want to help, but please do not give money or any other direct support to children who beg.*

- Giving money to children on the street who beg, park cars, or are part of the dance music group encourages these children to stay out of school, leave home and become street children.
- Begging promotes trafficking, exploitation and abuse of vulnerable children, into children to street life, substance abuse and drug addiction. It also makes them vulnerable to sexual exploitation.
- Giving direct support, such as food or clothing, does not help as it is sold or exchanged for drugs. It also keeps children out of the services set up to help them and affirms street life as the right choice.

The Western Cape has a comprehensive set of statutory and other support services, a social grant system and specialised organisations set up to help chronically abused, exploited and vulnerable children drifting towards street life.

Begging offers children no hope and no future,
